







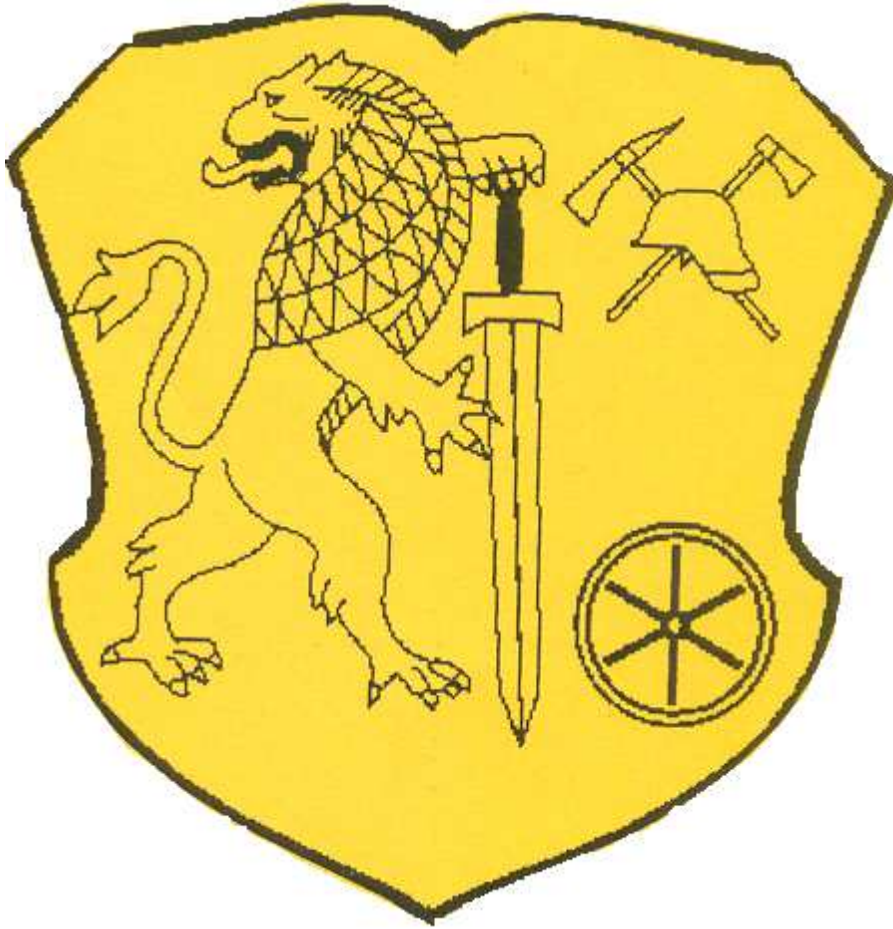


## Coat of Arms

	<p><u>time frame:</u> 1 ½ hour</p>
	<p><u>location:</u> a big room</p>
	<p><u>participants:</u> 6 – 20</p>
	<p><u>material:</u>                  A4 paper cut into 4 or 5 pieces each page (when they are put together they make a whole page of a puzzle)                  Some magazines                  colours                  handout</p>
	<p><u>procedure:</u>                  Either you already have small groups of participants or you build it (e.g. by parts of a puzzle).</p> <p>The group now designs a coat of arms, which is representative for every member of the group. They have twenty minutes to find commonalities between each other and after that a further twenty minutes to represent these commonalities in a family coat of arms. On the table there are different materials, which they can use for this task.</p> <p>Afterwards the coats of arms are presented to the other seminar participants. Naturally, everybody is invited to ask questions</p>
	<p><u>goal / purpose:</u>                  To bring together the members of a group and communicate in a creative way</p>
	<p><u>Questions for discussion:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- What new did you learn about the personality of your partners in the exercise</li> <li>- What were your feelings when you were given the instructions for the exercise and what are they now?</li> <li>- Did you find any difficulties in finding your commonalities?</li> </ul>
